Greetings all, I trust you all had a refreshing and relaxing Easter / Anzac Day long weekend as we enter the winter months.

The Board of Directors had a meeting on 27 April and I am delighted to announce that Brett Knight and Emma Merkas (nee Veale) have been appointed as new Board Directors. Brett is a CODA, based in Sydney and will lead the Fundraising portfolio as we set our sights on the Asia Pacific and Deaflympic Games in 2012 and 2013 respectively. Brett works with Cisco, a global communications company and has a strong interest in fundraising for community organisations, particularly deaf organisations.

Emma is a CODA as well, and based in Melbourne. Emma grew up in the deaf community through her late father Matthew Veale's involvement in deaf sports, particularly football (soccer). She will lead the Media & Communications portfolio, and heads up her own marketing company - Thirty Dollar Date, and writes weekly articles for Melbourne's daily paper, MX. I am sure you will join me in welcoming Brett and Emma into the deaf sports family! This follows a concerted effort by DSA to recruit Directors outside Victoria, and female Directors. Both Emma and Brett will serve two-year terms on the DSA Board, replacing Richard Pearce and Sonia Heath, who both stepped down in recent months.

Registrations for the 2012 Australian Deaf Games is open! Go to www.austdeafgames.org.au and register. Since launching the online registration system (for the first time ever) in partnership with Sporting Pulse, we have received registrations on a daily basis steadily. Do not miss out on the Early Bird Games Registration Fee, which expires on 30 June 2011. As highlighted in my report last month, New Zealand will be participating in the Games, and we are in discussions with Samoa and Fiji so that they can send athletes as well.

Perth hosted the International Lawn Bowls Invitational earlier this month, and DSA was represented by David Peters. DSA was a proud sponsor of the event. Congratulations goes to the Australian bowlers who did very well - the Australian Men's won gold in all events, with the Ladies winning bronze in the Team event. It was a very successful event, and results/photos can be found on our website.

Next month I will be representing DSA at Deaf Australia's National Conference in Hobart during 13-15 May 2011, and presenting a paper on sports and deaf youth, highlighting our national Schools Education Program. I will also be promoting the Australian Deaf Games at every opportunity, so if you're in Hobart for the conference, come up and see me!

The rescheduled ICSD Congress will now take place in September at a venue yet to be announced, although I understand an announcement is imminent. Furthermore, we received confirmation that the Asia Pacific Games for the Deaf will take place in Seoul, Korea during 19-26 May 2012.

All the best to our golfers ahead of the National Deaf Golf Championships, to be held in Adelaide during 6-8 May, and our male footballers as they participate in the 2nd Asia Pacific Deaf Football Championships, to be held in Korea in May.

On behalf of DSA, congratulations goes to our Manager, Craig Dodson, who had his wedding on Easter Thursday marrying the beautiful Sophie Ibbott. Best wishes on your married life together Craig and Sophie!

DSA Manager's Update



It has been a busy month at Deaf Sports Australia with the priority for the DSA office has been to finalise the online registration process for the Australian Deaf Games. Irena has been on leave on an overseas holiday for the last month, which has been a test for our resources, however, thankfully she is now back on deck and we are operating as normal.

The move to an online registration system for the Australian Deaf Games is a major step forward in professionalism for deaf sports and helps bring us up to the standard of all major multi sports events throughout the Country. So much of our work and personal lives is now 'on-line' and its great that with the click of a mouse you can now register for the ADG.

In April a meeting was held with Deaf Sports Australia, Cricket Australia and Deaf Cricket Australia to review The recent Lord's Taverners Australia Deaf Cricket Ashes & Tri Series and the ongoing MOU between all three parties. The relationship between all three parties has developed strongly over the last 18 months and we look forward to building on this momentum and helping to develop deaf cricket across the country.

Work has continued on the DSA Schools Education Program with the focus been confirming school workshops and seeking support from stakeholders such as Deaf Societies, Departments of Sport and Recreation and our DSA members. 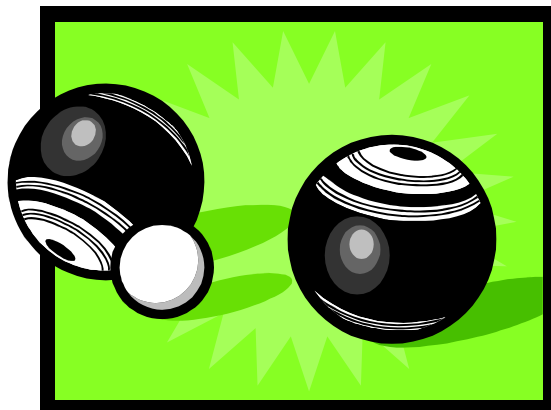

Aftermath of Slovakia Winter Deaflympics

Deaflympics is now facing an economic and social crisis with few parallels in our history. The failure of the Slovakian Deaflympic Organising Committee and the criminal fraud perpetrated by its President, Jaromir Ruda, have caused massive hardship to Deaf athletes and administrators around the world. The reputation of Deaf sport around the world has been severely damaged.

Need for Reform and Recovery

Faced with the outcome of the failed Winter Deaflympics in Slovakia, ICSD is bringing in independent investigation.

What is required is not just a change of faces around the ICSD Executive Board or ICSD Office table, but a new approach to Games management and to Deaf sports structure.

Under the old way of doing things, ICSD grew the Deaflympics to a completely unsustainable point. In 2009, the Taiwan Deaflympics required a \$72 million budget of 100% government funding. But at the same time as developing a model for the Deaflympics that depended completely on government funds, ICSD did not ask for any guarantee of government support from cities bidding for future Deaflympics. With no guarantee of government support provided during its bid, the organising committee for Athens 2013 folded after the Greek general election in 2009. The Hellenic Federation of Deaf Sports is currently working on a final attempt to win government backing for Athens 2013. We will know the outcome of this work in the weeks ahead.

Vancouver 2015's bid was chosen under a system where it was decided that cities could bid without needing the support of the relevant National Deaf Sports Organisation. And Vancouver 2015 failed too. Faced with the comprehensive failure of the Deaflympics and the old system of bidding, management and hosting, we must now push ahead with nothing less than complete reform.

From October 2009, the ICSD members voted for new President and Board to implement strategic change. This change is now more vital than ever. I stood for election on the basis that isolation and the old way of doing things was no longer the answer. Now more than ever, that is clearly the case.

Based on this strong mandate and faced with the failure of the Deaflympics, ICSD will bring in independent help to investigate what went wrong and how to radically improve. There will be an independent, realistic and honest assessment of the crisis facing the organisation.

ICSD already has a strategic plan for the future that has gained the respect of the Olympic Movement. To this, we will add the reform of the Deaflympics. This work will be implemented by the Executive Board and of course our new Chief Executive. We are fortunate, at this critical time, to be joined by a sports professional with considerable IOC experience of how to successfully manage the bidding and hosting of the Olympic and Paralympic Games.

Following a policy of engagement with the rest of the Olympic Movement, not isolation, the IOC President has also written to me expressing the IOC's willingness to help us investigate, reform and improve.
Relationship with the IOC

We need to bring to an end to the situation where the IOC is portrayed as being on one side and ICSD on another. Following the strategic plan I initiated, the Executive Board will be overhauling its relationship with the IOC and with other sporting bodies. Deaf sport does not exist in isolation: We use the competition rules of International Federations. Our anti-doping work is governed by WADA. We must embrace the opportunities that these organisations provide.

National Sovereignty

ICSD maintains that strong national members are the basis for a healthy Deaf sports movement. To this extent we are renewing our work to ensure the position of National Deaf Sports Federations is respected.

Many models now exist around the world. Varying by country, ICSD members are sometimes completely independent, sometimes self-organising entities within National Olympic Committees, National Disabled Sports Organisations or National Paralympic Committees.

Mutual respect among sports bodies at the national level is best supported by mutual respect at the international level. I will continue to ensure that our progress with the IOC and IPC with regard to the autonomy of Deaf sport is strongly maintained.

Deaf Sport for Deaf Athletes

No sporting organisation can be successful if it does not put the needs of Deaf athletes first and foremost. I recognise that ICSD has for many years not done enough to prove that the wellbeing of Deaf athletes is our first priority. This is demonstrated by the long lack of an active athlete's commission. The re-establishment of this commission is a priority.

Deaf Sports Reform

It is now time to concentrate on the fundamentals. If ICSD is to be taken seriously as an organisation that serves high-performance Deaf athletes, by ensuring high-performance competitions, then this is what we must deliver.
